## Advent Activities fill the Season at FCC

Advent begins this week at First Christian with the annual **Women's Ministries Brunch** on Saturday, Dec. 5, followed by the "**Deck the Halls**" party in the afternoon. Wednesday night **Advent vespers** also began on Dec. 2, and will continue for the Wednesdays leading up the Christmas. The brief service begins at 7 pm in the Fireside Lounge, and is an informal gathering time of prayer, meditation and communion.

Three music programs will be presented in our sanctuary during the Advent Season.

We are thrilled to be able to host for the second time a production of Gian Carlo Menotti's opera *Amahl and the Night Visitors* on Friday night, Dec. 18, at 7:30 pm. ## Bob offers Beard as gift and challenge

Following our current round of Unbinding the Gospel meetings, a week ago Sunday I put forth a challenge to the FCC worshipping community. It was a challenge that contained both a gimmick and a gift. The gimmick is that if all of you together invite enough people to have 250 in worship on Christmas Sunday, December 20, I will shave off my beard of 31 years. That means that every person currently attending will have to invite about 2.6 people (how you work out inviting .6 of a person is your concern). The purpose of this

proposal: it's weird enough, perhaps, to be an encouragement for you to invite folks to church. The gift is that, as well, if we have 250 in worship on December 20, I will donate \$300 to regional ministry.

Why am I doing this, you may ask? Martha Grace Reese, in her viewpoints on evangelism, says that the first people to whom a church needs to evangelize are those closest to us, family and friends. Tex Sample, a leading Disciples scholar, in his book [U.S. Lifestyles and Mainline Churches](#) found in his demographic studies that fundamentalist churches grow because they hold on to their family base; as the families grow and add children, they tend to stay with their church community.

He also found that with mainline churches, the opposite is true: We don't hold onto our families, and therefore, we are shrinking. If we can start by reclaiming our community base – the families and friends around us, then we have the opportunity to rebuild the community by adding new folks through a second worship service and other efforts.

I like my beard. And if you get 250 folks in church on Dec. 20, I'll shave it off that morning, but it probably won't stay off. Nevertheless, it's a sacrifice for me to offer up my beard for the FCC cause. I'm encouraging you to sacrifice, to risk yourselves a bit, to help grow the body of Christ, and I've tried to give you an easy, somewhat wacky way to do so. How about it, folks?

I'd like to see YOU (and 2.6 or more of your family/friends) on any Sunday!

## Transition Team Report

The Transition Team for FCC is responsible for developing and forwarding to the Board and Congregation recommendations for the congregation's future. The team, currently composed of Pat Dunlop, Tom Curry, Skip Wolverton, Val Dunham, Bobbie Hall, and Martha Harris, along with Bob Brite and Dennis Sanders, has met six times since late July. The issues the Team has discussed and are working through have been wide-ranging and complex, including, but not limited to the following:

- whether to move or to close;
- whether to move into ecumenical partnership with another congregation;
- whether to stay in the Whittier neighborhood or relocate to the suburbs;
- what sort of experiments to conduct in the ministry of FCC to define its ministry and encourage its growth; and,
- whether the energy of the congregation is of such a nature to invest itself in such experiments.

To this point, the Team has come up with the following understandings:

- 1) The central question to be addressed by FCC is "What is best thing that we can do to promote the life of the Church, the body of Christ, through FCC's future?"
- 2) The question of moving is secondary to the question of viability – in other words, it is not a good idea, and in fact is poor stewardship of God's resources, to buy or build another congregational plant if the church is going to continue to decline, decline to the point of closure in not more than another 10 – 15 years.
- 3) The question of viability is directly related to age demographic – the congregation has a strong group of people in their 60's, 70's, and 80's. The congregation's greatest need is to develop a minis-

try that attracts more of the younger generations: youth and children, 20's, 30's, 40's, and 50's.

In the light of these understandings, the Transition Team is trying to develop proposals for the congregation to chew over and consider concerning what the congregation may look like in five years.

The Team also endorses, in the spirit of transformation, a proposal by Pastors Brite and Sanders to begin an alternative worshipping community movement in the life of FCC, but with the provision that the current FCC community can see it as an appropriate ministry of the church and be willing to pour time, talent, resources, and ownership into the effort. The proposal for this has gone through the Worship Committee, been passed by the Board, and \$50,000 has been allocated by Finance Committee in the 2010 Budget for that purpose. That allocation, as well as the whole 2010 Budget, will be dealt with by the Board at a special board meeting on December 20 following worship.

The Team continues to meet on the average of about every 3 weeks, and in future meetings will be consulting with other congregations going through similar circumstances, developing further programmatic experiments for transformation, and continuing to wrestle with that central question defined above. Team members welcome congregational input as well.

### Special Board Meeting set for Dec. 20

There will be a special, brief Board meeting following worship on Sunday, December 20, to deal with the matters of nominations and budgets. The regularly scheduled Board meeting on December 22 has been cancelled per the decision at the November meeting.

## FCC Board Notes

The Church Board met on Nov. 17 to hear reports and consider motions. Sixteen people plus the two pastors attended the meeting. Highlights from the minutes include the following:

- The Outreach committee brought a motion that the Board approve matching funds for the agencies (Feed My Starving Children and Community Emergency Service) designated to receive offerings for *Amahl and the Night Visitors*. Motions carried.
- The board chair brought a motion to extend Dennis Sanders' contract for another year. Motion carried.
- Several groups and committees reported using funds to support various missions

and programs. Women's Ministries contributed \$4000 to Disciples Mission Fund; Outreach provided \$5000 for an Emergency Fund for members in need, \$1000 to Rochester for a new church start, \$1000 to Heifer International, \$1000 for seed money for local mission funds, \$500 to Groveland Foodshelf, \$1500 to Week of Compassion, and \$500 to Reconciliation.

The special December Board Meeting on Dec. 20 after church will focus on the budget for the coming year and nominations for the 2010 terms of elders, deacons and trustees.
